Ohio State Football Postgame Notes

- Ohio State improves to 7-1 all-time against Nebraska and 5-1 since the Cornhuskers joined the Big Ten Conference.
- Ohio State has won 10 consecutive games overall dating back to last season, the second-longest active streak among Power Five teams.
- The Buckeyes are 2-1 all-time in games played at Nebraska's Memorial Stadium.
- Ohio State is now 62-27 in night games all-time (5 p.m. or later local start time) and 31-12 on the road.
- Since 2012, the Buckeyes are 21-5 in road night games and 28-3 in road Big Ten contests.
- The Buckeyes scored 20 or more points for the 30th consecutive game. That streak is tied with UCF for the second longest in the nation.
- Ohio State has outscored its five opponents 173-22 in the first half so far this season after leading 38-0 at the half vs. Nebraska.
- OSU topped 500 yards of total offense for the fourth consecutive game, finishing the night with 580 yards.
- The Ohio State defense limited Nebraska to 231 yards of total offense. The Buckeyes have allowed fewer than 300 yards of total offense in each of the first five games.
- The defense also produced a takeaway for the fifth-consecutive game to open the season and for the 13th time in the last 15 games dating back to last season.
- The OSU defense limited Husker QB Adrian Martinez to just 8-of-17 passing for 47, which is the second-worst performance of his career. He also threw a career-high three interceptions.
- After recording his first career interception last week, Jeff Okudah intercepted two passes tonight. He is the first Buckeye with multiple interceptions in a game since Marshon Lattimore vs. Tulsa in 2016.
- Justin Fields recorded both a rushing and a passing touchdown for the fifth-consecutive game to open his Buckeye career. He is the first Big Ten quarterback to accomplish that feat in the first five games since Indiana's Antwan Randle-EI in 1999.
- Fields threw for 212 yards and three touchdowns while also rushing for 72 yards and another score.
- Junior RB J.K. Dobbins became the 11th player in program history to top 3,000 career rushing yards. He passed Antonio Pittman (2,945), Michael Wiley (2,951), Carlos Snow (2,999) and Pepe Pearson (3,076) on the career rushing list. He is now 10th all-time with 3,110 yards.
- Dobbins reached 100 yards rushing for the third time in the first five games.
- Ohio State improved to 12-0 over the last three seasons when Dobbins rushes for 100 or more yards.
- Dobbins has surpassed the century mark in each of his three career games against Nebraska.
- Running back Master Teague III rushed for a career-high two touchdowns, with one coming in the first half. That gave him three touchdowns for the season and four for his career.
- Senior WR K.J. Hill caught a pass in his 39th straight game, the second longest streak in school history.
- Hill surpassed the 1,900-yard career receiving mark and moved into 10th place on the school's all-time yards receiving list, passing Joey Galloway (1991-94).
- Wide out Austin Mack hauled in three passes for a season-high 66 yards and his first touchdown of the season.
- Chase Young recorded a sack for the sixth straight game dating back to last season. He now has eight for the season and 22 for his career.
- Linebackers Baron Browning and Malik Harrison each made a team-high seven tackles on the night. For Harrison, that was a season-high while for Browning, it marked a career-high.
