BY THE NUMBERS

2 - This marks the second time Columbus has hosted the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship, previously hosting in 2016

8 - Of the 12 players selected for the gold-medal winning 2020 U.S. Olympic Women's Volleyball Team, eight participated in the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship during their collegiate careers

11 - Eleven programs have won the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball National Championship. Stanford leads the group with nine titles, winning three of the last five (2016, 2019, 2020)

23 - Host institution Ohio State has competed in the NCAA tournament 23 times, most recently making the Sweet Sixteen in 2020

41 - This marks the 41st year of the NCAA women's volleyball championship and the 115th year of the NCAA as an association

340 - There are 340 NCAA institutions that support Division I women's volleyball, including 12 Division I programs in the state of Ohio

17,345 - Columbus hosted 17,345 fans at Nationwide Arena for the 2016 National Championship match between Texas and Stanford. In totality, the championship had an economic impact of more than \$14M for the city
